July 7, 2019 Irela Bagué, president, Bagué Group

Last week: Americans proudly commemorated our patriotism and freedom this Independence Day. The county commission lead by Commissioner Rebeca Sosa passed a resolution creating a Biscayne Bay Task Force to prioritize actions and create a long-term path for our Bay's recovery. The time has come to truly focus on the health of Biscayne Bay and its importance to Miami-Dade's and Florida's economy.
